SQIFF is back and celebrating its 10th edition! Looking back on a decade of sharing queer stories, and the huge privilege of collaborating with LGBTQIA+ communities of so many backgrounds, we've shaped SQIFF 2025 with a deepened commitment to our core values of community, accessibility, and diversity.

We've continued our year-round work championing and supporting queer filmmakers in Scotland and beyond with our Queer Filmmakers Group, SQIFF Directory, and Filmmaking Workshops for Trans and Non-Binary people and QTIPOC+. This year, we are buzzing to present SQIFF 2025 Festival across venues in Glasgow's Merchant City, including GMAC, Listen Gallery, The Boardwalk and The Social Hub, with our closing party at The Art School.

This year's Opening Night Scottish Shorts once again spotlights bold and brilliant work from local queer filmmakers. We're excited to bring back our Best Scottish Short Award and introduce Director's Cut, our brand-new, limited-edition beer brewed in collaboration with Closet Brewing.

We've also welcomed new programming voices into the team and they've helped shape a powerful, moving, and delightfully strange selection of films. This year's festival features 24 curated events, over 90 short films, four features and a Halloween horror event, plus talks, panels, performances, and more. Our screening collaborators this year include Queer East, Oska Bright Film Festival, Take One Action Film Festivals and for the first time, Mostra Queer Brasil joins us to spotlight queer imagination across Brazil.

In 2025, we're proud to present a brand-new industry event in partnership with Trans on Screen – a speed-dating-style networking space for trans and queer filmmakers to meet peers, collaborators, and creatives from across the industry.

Outside the screening rooms, SQIFF continues to offer a range of activities for community, creativity, and connection. Come along to our queer craft fair, meet local artists, and hang out at our filmmaker social. You can also stop by Listen Gallery, which will host The River and The Glen, Camp Trans Scotland: The Exhibition, an exhibition and screening exploring the first Camp Trans gathering in the Highlands.

As always, we invite folks to chill, chat and connect during the week, with informal social spaces and time to unwind. For our Closing Night, we've teamed up with scandal.gla and WSHWSH for a celebration of Glasgow's QTIPOC+ brilliance with a euphoric party showcasing the joy, power, and excellence of Glasgow's most vital queer inclusive POC collectives. See you all very soon!

See **www.sqiff.org** for full film and event listings. Tickets can be booked online in advance or bought on the door. Please arrive 15 minutes before the advertised start time. After that, we may release tickets to walk-ins.

Tickets for most events are on a sliding scale of FREE, £4, £8, £12, £16, £20. Choose what to pay based on your circumstances. If you can afford more, it helps us out if you pay more. This allows us to have free or cheap tickets for those who most need them and keep the festival going as well as support queer filmmakers. Booking can also be done in person at our venues for the event happening at that time.

SQIFF SLIDING SCALE TICKETS: WHAT SHOULD I PAY?

In order to make SQIFF more accessible to those on a low income, we use a sliding scale ticket price for our events. You can choose what you pay based on your circumstances – you won't be asked for any proof/ID. We just ask that you are honest!

FREE or £4

- ✓ I frequently stress about meeting basic* needs and don't always achieve them.
- ✓ I have debt and it sometimes prohibits me from meeting my basic needs.
- ✓ I rent lower-end properties or have unstable housing.
- ✓ I sometimes can't afford public or private transport. If I own a car/have access to a car, I am not always able to afford petrol.

ACCESSIBILITY



All of the venues for SQIFF 2025 (GMAC, Listen Gallery, The Art School, The Boardwalk, The Social Hub) have access for wheelchair users and people with other mobility issues. This includes wheelchair accessible toilets on each floor, level access at the front entrance, and lift access to all public areas.



All films have English language descriptive subtitles.



All our events will have BSL-English interpretation. We will also have BSL-English interpreters at the reception before events and for socialising after events.



All our events will have live captioning.



Induction loops are available at The Social Hub, Boardwalk, Listen Gallery.



We have audio description available for some of our film programme. Headsets can be collected from the entrance of the event or please ask a member of staff. Film screenings with audio description are marked in the brochure.



Support animals and service animals such as guide dogs are welcome at all venues.

The lights will be slightly up during all screenings and people are welcome to come and go during events as they need to. Disposable ear-plugs will be available. These can be collected from the Quiet Room and Access Table or please ask a member of staff.

There will be a supply of FFP2 masks available throughout the venues we are using for anyone who needs one.

There is a designated Quiet Room at the Art School, GMAC, The Boardwalk, and The Social Hub that will be open from at least half an hour before the first event each day until after the last event of the day starts.

Comfy bean bags are available in all event spaces. Seating can be reserved on request, please email us at **info@sqiff.org** for this.

Films not certified by the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC) are marked N/C and accompanied by an age recommendation, e.g. N/C 15+ (suitable for ages 15 and over - no-one under 15 will be admitted). Events may also have a specified age limit, e.g. ages 18+, due to overall content.

Content notes and access notes for films are available throughout the brochure and will be presented at the start of events.

We will have a photographer for some events at the festival. If you would prefer your photo isn't taken or shared publicly, please let the photographer or a member of our team know.

We have an Audience Access Fund that can support any audience member with costs within Scotland to be able to attend our events (ie. travel or childcare costs). Please get in touch by emailing **info@sqiff. org** or speak to our team at the festival if you require this. You do not need to give a reason for accessing the fund.

There is limited street parking available outside the venues.

Glasgow Taxis has a range of accessible vehicles including Euro 7 and some Euro 8 taxis with flat board ramps. You can contact them by telephone on **0141 429 7070**, or book through their app.

We aim to create a generally safe and inclusive environment at the Festival and ask people to respect each other and be sensitive to the diversity of identities within LGBTQIA+ communities. If you feel unsafe at any point, please feel welcome to speak to a member of the team.

Exhibition

The River and The Glen, Camp Trans Scotland: The Exhibition

Listen Gallery, Monday 27th - Friday 31th: 2-7pm, United Kingdom, N/C 18+, English audio

Cradled by the mountains, refreshed by the clear river, walk into the deep magic of Camp Trans Scotland. This exhibition holds its viewers in a moment of peace, pausing the chaos outside. It leads the audience into a time and space built on and by nature, community care and trans ancestry.

Photographs from 2024 and 2025 take the viewer into a world still vibrating within the camp trans folks. It invites the viewer under its green shield, to breathe the golden air, heal, and restore the strength we need to face the relentless attacks on trans people.

Stones, and other objects from the Camp will be in the space, available to touch, smell, creating a palpable, alive, archive. The stones will be returned to the glen, taking with them those who touched them.

The film made at the first camp, The River and The Glen, will play every hour.

United Kingdom, 30 min

The first Scottish Camp Trans happened in September 2024, near Aberfeldy. Cradled by the mountains, far away from cis-society for a weekend, we existed on our own terms. Far from being a commodified retreat, Camp Trans was a coming together of trans people to rest and restore our strength.

Content notes: Depiction of one image of naked people (chest up) & seen from behind from feet up to head. Discussions of ableism, alcohol use, current trans panic, drug use, racism, transphobia.

Swipe Right on Your Next Film Collab

The Social Hub Theatre, Time: 5pm (120m), all ages

Join SQIFF and Trans on Screen for an exciting speed-filmmaking event exclusively for queer and trans filmmakers. Designed in a fast-paced "speed dating" format, this session connects queer and trans directors, producers and HODs looking to spark new collaborations and bring fresh stories to life. Whether you're an emerging filmmaker or already working in the industry, this is a unique opportunity to meet potential creative partners, share ideas, and build community in a focused, time-efficient setting.

Each short round of conversation allows participants to introduce their work, explore shared interests, and discover new possibilities for partnership. Expect a warm, welcoming space centred on creative exchange and mutual support, where trans voices lead the conversation.

Bring your project ideas, passion, and curiosity! This is your chance to connect with the next wave of queer and trans filmmaking talent and maybe even meet your next collaborator.

The selected short films highlight the diversity of LGBTQIA+ films being made right here in Scotland. Before we spend the week enjoying cinematic treats from across the globe, let's take a moment to appreciate the talented and close-knit queer community we are so grateful to have right here. Expect bright colours, lovely creatures, big laughs and plenty of fun informal chat in our post-screening Q&A with the filmmakers.

This Werewolf Complex

Dir. Heather E Andrews, 2024, United Kingdom, 15 min

A moving image portrait exploring brain auras through personal voices, examining seizure warnings, social stigma, and their positive impact on artistic expression.

TWISTED PAIR

Dir. Edward Gwyn Jones, 2023, United Kingdom, 13 min

Two characters engage in erotic, absurdist phone calls that invert power dynamics, sampling 1975-1985 queer cinema and pop culture.

Late Bloomers

Dir. Axel Gutapfel, 2024, United Kingdom, 6 min

Late Bloomers depicts a post-nature world where Glasgow's queer community creates reality through mimicking wilderness they've never known.

Three Act Structure

Dir. Iona Rose Wheeler, 2025, United Kingdom, 3 min

Iona recounts and imagines experiences discussing gender with doctors.

Content notes: Discussion of difficulties in accessing trans healthcare, medical conversations, transphobia.

TAPS

Dir. Louis O. Utieyin, 2025, United Kingdom, 7 min

When Max unknowingly summons a demon on Grindr, he must do whatever it takes to survive.

Content notes: Discussion of drug use, sex.

Access notes: Flashing imagery.

Taxonomy

Dir. Ren Leverentz, 2025, United Kingdom, 11 min

Using a combination of movement art and conversation, Taxonomy is a short documentary that explores the relationship between language and gender for trans and non-binary people.

Content notes: Discussion of dysphoria, misgendering.

The Figure in the Carpet

Dir. Fibi Cowley, 2024, United Kingdom, 7 min

Personal reflection on living with hallucinations, told through experimental puppetry and informed by the director's lived sensory experiences.

Well ... Actually

Dir. Zyra Evangelista, 2025, United Kingdom, 13 min

When xeir best friend pulls a prank that goes terribly wrong, an agoraphobic doomsday pepper becomes the world's last hope for survival... or so they think.

Content notes: Depiction of misgendering, strong language use. Discussion of climate change, genocide, homelessness, intense fears and phobias.

Tuesday 28 October

How We Loved, How We Broke

The Boardwalk Gold Room, 6pm (98m), Various Directors, N/C 18+, Arabic, English, French, Mandarin Chinese, Persian, Tagalog, Yue Chinese (Cantonese) audio

Love arrives in many forms, and heartbreak rarely leaves without a trace. How We Loved, How We Broke brings together six short films that explore intimacy, longing, separation, and survival. Each story reveals a different facet of queer connection, from fleeting encounters and deep ruptures to surreal escapes and quiet acts of care.

Spanning cities, languages, and emotional landscapes, this programme offers a tender and vivid reflection on the ways queer people love, lose, remember, and move forward. Whether anchored in reality or slipping into fantasy, these films speak to the complexity of queer relationships and the echoes they leave behind.

Following the screening, join us for a live performance by Glasgow-based multidisciplinary artists Simone Seales and Mele Broomes, sharing new music from Simone's upcoming poetry-music album 'Dearest' which is inspired by the warmth, nostalgia, and tension of queer first love.

Aliens In Beirut

Dir. Raghed Charabaty, 2025, Lebanon, 17 min

A Lebanese immigrant returns to Beirut for the first time in a decade, only to find love and horror by the sea, in the alleyways, and on the elusive rooftops of the city - right before the 2020 Beirut Port Explosion.

Content notes: Depiction of cigarette use, destruction, explosion. Discussion of homophobia, war.

At Least We Had This Moment

Dir. Joshua de Vera, 2025, Philippines, 20 min

In his quest to capture the aged architecture of Manila, film photographer Dino seeks the company of a local stranger, Vince. But as the city noises grew, their stories stood out.

Content notes: Depiction of cigarette use.

Earworm

Dir. Ilias Merabiha, 2025, France, Germany, 11 min

Tormented Gaspard battles a parasitic worm feeding on his grief after romance ends, undergoing cathartic metamorphosis through healing rituals.

(ندع غاب) EDEN

Dir. Rustin Zam-Zam Madadi, 2024, United States of America, 10 min

In the sun-soaked suburbs of Orange County, CA, Roya returns home seeking a fresh start, only to become entangled in a web of desire at an all-women's yoga studio with their trans masculine counterpart. As loyalties shift and old wounds resurface, the studio transforms into a battleground where love and hate collide.

Fortune Favours the Fantabulous

Dir. Emmanuel Li, 2023, United Kingdom, 25 min

Non-binary fortune teller Fei Liu's marsh tent becomes invaded by phantoms over three days, threatening their reality and future.

Purebred

Dir. Caleb J. Roberts, 2025, Ireland, United Kingdom, 15 min

During a heatwave in Belfast, transgender man Owen returns to the flat of his on-off-again lover Seán after taking a pregnancy test.

Content notes: Depiction of non-explicit nudity, sex scenes, strong language use. Discussion of pregnancy.

Tuesday 28 October

Rookie

The Boardwalk Black Room, 6.30pm (94m), Dir. Samantha Lee, N/C 15+, 2023, Philippines, English and Tagalog audio

Ace is a tall, awkward teenager who moves to an all-girls Catholic high school in the Philippines. The volleyball coach spots Ace on her first day, and invites her to try out for the team. She is initially no good at the sport and socially ostracised, but things begin to change when she falls for the highly motivated team captain, Jana, who dislikes her because she sees her as a threat. But the girls and their teammates must nonetheless join forces: not only to successfully compete in competitions, but also to face up against a more disturbing, insidious threat. Powered by authentic performances, Samantha Lee's heartfelt film captures the resilience of the young athlete as she struggles for acceptance, and the strength of female solidarity in a society rigged against women.

Content notes: Depiction of sexual assault. Discussion of distressing themes.

Scottish Shorts 2

The Boardwalk Theatre, 9pm (76m), Various Directors, N/C 18+, Chinese, English, Mandarin audio (shown again on Saturday 1st November) The Social Hub Meeting Room 3, 3:30pm

Returning for another year at the festival, Scottish Shorts 2 is a bold and intimate programme of short films by queer filmmakers working across Scotland. This selection continues to explore the queer Scottish experience through stories shaped by displacement, desire, care, survival, and play.

These films move between personal documentary, narrative storytelling, and experimental textures. Some reflect on home and migration, others explore relationships, identity, and transformation. These films reveal queer lives in all their depth and nuance, telling stories with humour and heart.

At its core, this programme brings forward voices and perspectives too often absent from Scottish screens. It celebrates a growing queer cinema that is rooted, restless, and unapologetically present.

All filmmakers in this screening and in 'Scottish Shorts 1' are automatically entered into a competition to win the title of Best Scottish Short. The winner will be announced at the closing screening of SQIFF 2025.

Following the screening, we'll be joined by the filmmakers for a Q&A to reflect on their work, share insights, and open up space for conversation.

Films in this programme include:

A Journey Of The Leaves

Dir. Yash Zhang, 2024, United Kingdom, 11 min

When memories of his father's violence chase him from China, a queer filmmaker drifts into an autumntouched Estonian town. There, a wandering traveler, a bookstore owner, a poet's living statue, and another queer Chinese soul carrying similar wounds guide him through the scattered pieces of his past.

Content notes: Discussion of violence.

Be Honest!

Dir. Alice Harper, 2025, United Kingdom, 11 min

With a chance to win £100,000 for their ailing child, a couple enter a game show where they must face the most brutal challenge of all — being honest.

Before You Leave

Dir. Louise Thomas, 2024, United Kingdom, 12 min

On the day before her move to Australia, Innes, a veterinarian in her mid-twenties, grapples with mounting uncertainty as she and her sister, Saoirse, navigate the streets of Edinburgh. On this journey, they deliver the last of her belongings to a coworker, an ex-boyfriend, and a childhood friend. Each encounter becomes a poignant reminder of what she's leaving behind.

Keith

Dir. Steven Fraser, 2024, United Kingdom, 8 min

A Glasgow filmmaker discovers a dead body behind bins and embarks on a phone-based investigation to identify the victim. Using animation techniques exploring social media, apps, and blogs, the film examines neurodiversity and autistic communication styles while building tension toward revealing the deceased person's name.

Content notes: Depiction of animated nudity, drug use.

Bowl

Dir. John Kelbie, 2025, United Kingdom, 10 min

Arthur is an elderly, quick-witted, gay man who has recently been diagnosed with arthritis. Upon finding out that his old foe and competitor Norma is playing in the upcoming lawn bowls charity match, Arthur seeks the chance to prove himself. He faces many challenges along the way as he bickers with Norma and comes to terms with his illness and the losses he has faced, but with a little help from Norma's granddaughter Jenn, he is able to confront his past and learn what is truly important to him.

Content notes: Discussion of death, grief, illness, loss.

Cahā

Dir. Chak Hin Leung, 2024, United Kingdom, 10 min

Intimate documentary capturing two immigrants—Indian and Bruneian—meeting in a London teahouse. Over tea ("cahā"), their casual conversation reveals profound stories of sacrifice, identity, and adaptation. The film explores immigrant experiences and colonial tea legacy, showing how this simple ritual creates unexpected connection and understanding across borders.

Content notes: Discussion of colonialism, transphobia.

Changing Homes

Dir. Mano Mandal, 2025, United Kingdom, 6 min

An Indian nonbinary transmasculine person goes to a European beach for the first time since their top surgery. As they sit and read about a historical trans person, they navigate the idea of being shirtless in public for the very first time. While doing so, they reflect on Eurocentric body standards and on their sense of home -- in their own body and amidst bodies of water.

First Contact

Dir. James Crang, 2025, United Kingdom, 8 min

In isolation on the moon, a gardener tends to his small patch of life. When another person appears, he is forced to confront his fears of connection. Will he nurture a bond that could bring light to his lonely existence, or will his anxiety keep him in darkness?

Wednesday 29 October

NO PRIDE IN GENOCIDE

The Boardwalk Gold Room, 3.30pm (74m), Various Directors, N/C 18+, Arabic and English audio

"I've always imagined you and me sitting out in the sun, hand in hand, free at last. We spoke of all the places we would go if we could. Yet you are gone now. If I had known the bombs falling around us would take you from me, I would have told the world how I adored you more than anything.

I'm sorry I was a coward."

- Words of a queer Palestinian, submitted to Queering the Map

NO PRIDE IN GENOCIDE confronts a brutal truth. While queer lives are celebrated and marketed in some parts of the world, elsewhere they are being bombed, silenced, and erased.

As Palestine is reduced to rubble and its people fight for survival, this programme stands in unwavering solidarity. It amplifies queer voices that refuse to be erased by genocide, pinkwashing, or complicity.

Featuring urgent works from Palestine, the diaspora, and Lebanon, this programme gathers stories of queer love, loss, resistance, and survival. Each film defies erasure, insisting on presence over silence. These works reject the idea that queerness can be separated from the violence, displacement, and repression that shapes the lives of those it affects. Some of these stories emerge from exile, tracing the long shadows of conflict and the quiet resilience of those still carrying memory across oceans.

Rooted in the Palestinian struggle, NO PRIDE IN GENOCIDE also reflects broader realities of queer Arab life under occupation, exile, and authoritarian rule. Across borders and identities, these films speak to the endurance of those living under systems of state violence and to the radical imagination it takes to survive them.

In a time when visibility is weaponised, we refuse silence. There is no queer liberation without the liberation of Palestine. There is no pride in genocide. Liberation for Palestine is liberation for us all.

Through intimate scenes of daily life, she reflects on gender reassignment desires, mourning her Palestinian lover's death, and facing societal aggressions that echo even in the filmmaker's provocative interview style.

In a post-apocalyptic future, an intergalactic explorer lands at an abandoned museum on a quest to find traces of his long-lost ancestors, and ends up being teleported to the dance floor of a Brazilian queer nightclub in the 1990s.

In a future drained of colour, Oscar and his ailing husband struggle with a medical system where energy credits are the new currency. But as his energy fades, so does the possibility of a future together.

With a mix of esoteric wit and heart-wrenching earnestness, her work concerns such novelties as sex, death, nostalgia, celebrity, and, ultimately, the ache inside which can never be filled! Her self-published project Thumb Suck Girl is an annual photobook of fashion photography, art and creative writing, that aims to platform voices from underrepresented backgrounds in traditional media.

Wild Hopes Studio

Abby (she/they) is a queer freelance florist working as wild Hopes floral studio. They create affordable, sustainable floral arrangements for every occasion, working across Glasgow and beyond. Abby will be offering handmade dried flower creations at the craft fair, which are wild and whimsical - and will last for years to come!

Re:Frame

The Social Hub Meeting Room 3, 12.30pm (58 min) Various Directors, N/C 18+, English and Portuguese audio

This special screening showcases bold and original short films created by participants of the SQIFF Filmmaking Workshops for Trans and Non-Binary People, led by artist and filmmaker Erica Monde. Delivered in collaboration with Scottish Trans, the workshops offered a series of collaborative sessions where participants explored storytelling, visual language, and filmmaking techniques in a supportive, trans-led space. Bury Your Gays follows actor Grace, who can't understand why every role she lands ends in her untimely death—until a mysterious agent explains the 'Bury Your Gays' trope. Now, trapped in a genre-hopping battle for survival, Grace has one mission: do not die.

ASL

Dir. Cal Freeman, 2024, United Kingdom, 5 min

Rulf (19) meets Ziggy (38) for a car hookup, but attraction turns awkward when Ziggy's internalized homophobia clashes with Rulf's progressive views. After confronting contradictions and guilt, a flamboyant radio ad breaks the tension. They reconnect through laughter, reconsidering their desires before finally embracing their mutual attraction.

Bi-Nocular Panic

Cass and Jane spend their afternoon doing what every normal teenager does on a sunny day: spying on boys. But when the captivating Melody appears, Cass realises she might be interested in more than just boys.

Gender Reveal

Dir. Mo Matton, 2024, Canada, 13 min

Rhys, a dedicated people pleaser, winds up at their boss' gender reveal party with their two partners. The trans throuple soon realize that they are dealing with more than they were prepared for and their ability to survive the event comes into question.

Sriracha

Dir. Weili Hsing, 2024, United Kingdom, 10 min

In a chaotic London kebab shop, Asian drag king Li clashes with traditional Turkish chef Hamza over sriracha. When drunk British lads arrive seeking trouble, a simple condiment dispute erupts into a full food fight. Through the mayhem, Li and Hamza discover their shared experience bridges cultural divides, forging unexpected friendship.

Principal Boy

Dir. Maz Murray, 2024, United Kingdom, 22 min

Principal Boy follows the audition, rehearsal, and performance of British pantomime's traditional lead—a male hero conventionally played by a woman in drag. Using and subverting pantomime conventions, it explores trans and gender-nonconforming representation in mainstream culture, examining presence and absence in film and theatre.


